Special congratulations must also go to Amy-Leigh Scott for her gold medal in the hammer throw at the NZ Athletic Championships at the end of last year – a truly remarkable achievement and just reward for all her hard work and commitment.

Our goals for this year are again focused around raising student achievement, particularly Maori achievement. To this end, we began the year by spending our Teacher Only Day at Whakapara Marae, with a programme planned by HOD Maori, Ngawai Haitana-Tuhoro, and Deputy Principal, Kim Rogers, supported by present and past students to help us focus on culturally responsive pedagogy, making our classrooms more student centred.

This was followed by the whole staff going to the start of the Year 13 camp for the first morning session as we firmly believe this camp is essential in preparing our senior students to make the most of their final year at school and in uniting them as a year group.

While Year 13 students were at camp, other year levels came in for their respective induction days. This year we were very lucky to have Brooke Neal, an ex-Head Girl (2008) and a current Black Stick come in to do presentations and workshops around goal setting, with many practical tips and recommended readings and apps to help along the way. We are aiming to bring her back again later in the year for follow up sessions and look forward to following her journey in the Black Sticks as she gains her 100th cap in the current series of games in Argentina.

This year, we have moved back to a six day timetable to give us greater flexibility and to reduce the number of split classes. However, the structure is different with the day beginning with whanau time. This is where we will start the day with Timatanga, the daily notices, checking attendance and uniform and anything else needed. There are two other half hour whanau times in the week for structured, planned activities. With the increased size of our roll, the whanau class is of increasing importance where every student can feel she belongs, with a whanau teacher who knows her well and where tuakana teina is visible (big sister looking after little sister).

We are very excited to be able to say finally, with certainty, that we will have our new ten classroom block ready for use at the start of next year. We have one more year of pain, with tight rooming being an understatement, until we are able to house Art, Commerce and Student Support in beautiful modern learning environments and in doing so, ease the pressure on everyone else. Our new weights room was completed over the holidays and is already in high demand. Next on the agenda will be a full revamp of the Lamb Block into modern learning environments which will provide more classrooms for the English department.



## Science Corner



**‘Hands-On at Otago’** is a great opportunity for Year 12 and 13 students to experience ‘Uni life’ and to test out a variety of courses that the University of Otago has to offer. We were lucky enough to receive a scholarship to fly down to Dunedin from the 15-20th of January. We joined over 400 students from all over the country who were selected to take part in a range of 40 different projects, ours being Geography (Tove) and Biochemistry (Rosie).

For the biochemistry course, we spent the week learning about genetic engineering. We used restriction enzymes to cut out the gene for the protein from the arctic tooth fish DNA, and then this was put into the plasmid of E coli to multiply. The E Coli then made the LDH protein. The protein was then separated and contained so that it could be used to test for lactase in soy sauce using DNA staining. It was an overall an extremely interesting topic and being able to individually complete the project made the experience that much more real.

The Geography project involved a lot of field work at the Dunedin beaches using amazing scientific instruments such as ground penetrating radar and laser surveying equipment. We completed activities which involved work in the sediment laboratory and exploration of common coastal management issues.

After our main projects each morning we had the opportunity to visit other departments of the University and explore Dunedin’s vibrant student life.

Mrs Suzie Scourfield comes to head up the Chemistry department. She is an experienced Chemistry teacher, originally from Wales but has taught at Avonside Girls High School in Christchurch.

Mr Tom Cull comes to us from Pakuranga College in Auckland and joins our Physics department.

Miss Emma Smith joins us as part of the Teach First NZ programme and brings lots of enthusiasm to her classes and is teaching Science and Chemistry.
